## Of Rumors, Rivers and a Railroad Depot

**H**istorians hate information that can't be substantiated but that is talked about as gospel. Every county has them and Clare County is no different. Rumors around Clare include a secret passage in the city of Clare that leads from an old hotel that was used by the Purple Gang. Or a tunnel that led from a gangster's home to the river that could be used as an escape route. Or even an old steam locomotive that came off the tracks and lies buried to this day in some swamp or lake.

Sadly, all those rumors are false (honest!). However, there is one rumor that is intriguing and CCHS would love to prove true or false. And that is the rumor of a cabin deep in the woods near Harrison that would house some of Chicago gangster Al Capone's men who

needed to get away from the heat of the law and so would come to this area to lay low.

The basis of the rumor is a county resident who claimed to have worked with Capone in Chicago. He had a home and some accommodations beside a lake that could have served as a retreat for gangsters looking for a bit of R&R. There is even a cabin in the woods where the men were rumored to have stayed. Did they? Ahhh, who knows? But we'd love to find out one way or another.



**E**ver been to the Lumberman's Monument along the Au Sable River near Oscoda? *The Michigan Historical Review* had a nice article on its history in the Fall 2017 magazine. Among the facts presented were the names of 91 men or

lumbering firms that contributed to the monument's \$50,000 cost (the equivalent of nearly \$750,000 in today's dollars) and appear on the monument's base. Among them names that played a part in our county's history that are appear there are W.S. Gerrish, Hackley & Hume, Edmund Hall and Ammi Wright.

# A Ship, A Crest and A Missing Book

In Clare Memorial Park is a monument with a ship's crest (also called a badge) that generally goes unnoticed by passers-by. The crest is from a WWII British destroyer called the HMS Clare and the crest was presented to the city in 1950 by representatives of the British Royal Navy who also gave the city some type of record book.

The monument contains an inscription that can be found below. Sadly, the record book is nowhere to be found. The last recorded mention of it was in 1994, when the late Hugh Maxwell sent a letter to the *Clare Sentinel* asking if anyone knew of the book's whereabouts. There is no evidence that he ever found the answer. So we are asking again: Does any-

one know what happened to the book, or at least have an idea of what it looked like? It's another mystery we'd love to solve!



*"This is a ship's badge from HMS Clare. In 1940, the U.S. sent 50 old destroyers to England under our Lend-Lease program. The USS Upshur was one of the first to sail.*

*The British renamed her in honor of our town.*

*For 5 wartime years, she guarded the sea lanes, protected the vital ship convoys, rescued sailor of torpedoed ships, and hunted down enemy submarines.*

*HMS Clare took part in the North Africa, Sicily, and Italy Invasions. On Nov. 2, 1942 she attacked and "probably sunk" a Nazi U-Boat 150 miles north of Oran.*

*HMS Clare was retired from active service in 1948.*

*In 1950, a British delegation came to Clare and presented the city with this badge and a record book of the WWII history of the 50 old four-stackers."*

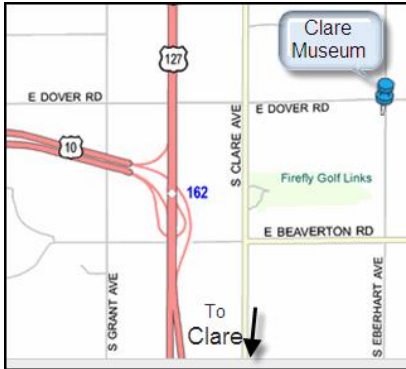
